Reflection from Our Parish Life Coordinator

Over the past couple of years we've heard from church leaders and expressed for ourselves a desire to include young people more fully in the life of the Church. Pope Francis held a Synod on Young People in 2018. One of the Jesuit Apostolic Preferences is to accompany youth in a hope filled future. At College Church we have been on a journey to have youth of varying ages engaged more fully in the life of the parish. As part of that journey, this Sunday, October 30th our parish is trying something new.

As part of our Youth Faith program, we used to hold class masses in the chapel. Each class celebrated their own mass once a year. Students in the class would lector, acolyte, bring up the gifts, help prepare the petitions and choose the songs. This was a nice opportunity for our youth to engage more fully in liturgy. It was ok if they were brand new to their role or if they made a mistake. The only problem was that they did it separately from the rest of the parish.

This year, we will begin having periodic family masses in the church at 10:30. By that, I mean that families - and especially our youth - will be invited to take on liturgical roles like ushering, lectoring, bringing up the gifts, and even leading our music. We will create space for our younger members to offer the gifts that they are developing. Some will be working side-by-side with our more experienced ministers.

So our liturgy may feel a little different at this Sunday's 10:30 am Mass; I hope it does. We may hear some new voices, recognize some new gifts and maybe sense a new way that the Holy Spirit is moving within our community.

World Mission Appeal

Pope Francis has invited all the church to enter into solidarity with the poor and struggling of the world.

“Mission is part of the ‘grammar’ of faith, something essential for those who listen to the voice of the Spirit who whispers ‘Come’ and ‘Go forth.’ Those who follow Christ cannot fail to be missionaries...” ~ Pope Francis

Our attention is drawn to the people in the 1150 missionary dioceses of the world. In these areas there are 1,200 schools, 9,000 clinics, and 10,000 orphanages that offer services to those in need. A collection will be taken up for them and envelopes are in the pews. We are each asked to be on Mission with the areas that have new churches developing. While most of us are not able to go to a distant place to help build communities of faith, we can support those who do go with our prayers and sacrificial gifts. Consider giving up some time, some activity or some expenditure to reflect upon the needs of our sisters and brothers who live in the missionary lands or who have gone there to serve and make a gift to support their efforts. Retirement Fund for Religious

Each November, we are invited to help support those women and men religious whose ministry has nourished our own faith, served our church, and strengthened our nation. Of 517 communities providing data, only 36 are adequately funded for retirement. Historically, Catholic sisters, brothers, and religious order priests received very little pay. Any surplus funds were reinvested in ministry and the education of younger members. As a result, hundreds of US religious communities lack adequate retirement savings. Like many Americans, religious communities face the monumental challenge of funding eldercare. Currently, the average annual cost of care for women and men religious past age 70 is

nearly \$51,000 per person. Skilled care is roughly \$78,000. The total cost of care for senior religious in the United States has exceeded \$1 billion annually for over a decade. Your donation will assist numerous religious communities in meeting the day-to-day needs and healthcare of their aging members and their health care expenses. Your gift makes a difference! Antiracism at College Church

At College Church, antiracism is an expression of our recognition that all are created in the image of God. As such, we respond—personally and collectively—to the call to identify, and to actively challenge, structures and systems that devalue people on the basis of race, and to practice restoration in the pursuit of justice.

Black History Matters

The celebration of All Souls and All Saints Day recalls how thin is the veil between the living and the dead. These holy days remind us anew to commemorate and honor our departed loved ones. They may have passed this physical world, but they remain with us in our thoughts, values, the very essence of who we are. The presence of some tangible marker—a gravestone, a burial site or mausoleum—also serves to remind us of those to whom we owe so much. But, for many African American families, no such tangible marker exists. Indeed, even written records of a life lived are hard to find. Whole generations of people who lived, loved, walked through this world, and contributed to society are forever lost. Such is just another insidious result of persistent racism.

It was not until the 1950s that the practice of segregated cemeteries stopped. Historically, black cemeteries have been the target of racist vandalism, persistent neglect, and even total abandonment. The souls buried in many of these cemeteries were often the descendants of slaves, lived hard lives of racial injustice, and had few resources to pay for proper gravesite/markers. The records normally recording a life lived—birth/marriage/death certificates, family lineage and history—are very often hard to find or nonexistent. The absence of this recognition, just these minimum recorded life markers, adds insult to the already profound moral injury of slavery, Jim Crow laws, and continued systemic racism.

A prominent example in the St. Louis area, indeed in this very neighborhood, is the Vashon family. The Vashons were distinguished teachers, administrators, and community organizers for African Americans in St. Louis. Although a St. Louis public high school is named after John Vashon, the place (the Father Dickson cemetery in Crestwood, named after abolitionist Moses Dickson) where the family is buried has no marker, no recognition of their existence. Volunteers at the cemetery have worked for more than three decades to maintain it—at one point, restoring it after a late-night party left the cemetery strewn with trash and overgrown weeds. Even as these volunteers grow older and their physical capabilities limited, their will remains strong to get the cemetery and its inhabitants the recognition they deserve for posterity. One of their final hopes is that the Vashon family receive a proper grave marker. The executive

director of the George B. Vashon Museum of African American History, on St. Louis Avenue, has pledged to help with some funds. But much is needed, and time grows short. The stories enshrined in these “forgotten” cemeteries, these “forgotten” lives, are stories of hard work, dedication to country, love of family, business success, leadership, community involvement, and advancement of education. They have contributed to enriching not only African American heritage but also the American culture. Just as Black Lives Matter, Black History Matters as well!

In 1923, the Institute separated from the mother organization and has spent the last one hundred years promoting diversity, prosperity, and inclusion. The organization aspires to make St. Louis a region that provides equitable opportunities for everyone to achieve their greatest potential and contribute to the development of a vibrant community. It has built a robust foundation of programs for resettlement, social services, education, language access, career development, and community engagement.

This summer the International Institute revived its Festival of Nations in Tower Grove Park, the largest multicultural event in the region. A weekend of food, dance, music, and artisan demonstration helped to bridge the divide between native-born and immigrant communities.

With limited resources, the International Institute is looking for volunteers (individuals and groups) and donations. Volunteers can co-host monthly on-site client lunches; tutor both high school students and adult learners; and/or function as a teacher's assistant with the adult clients. The Institute maintains Target and Wal-Mart wish lists identifying home goods and furnishings, cleaning supplies, diapers, etc. for the newly arrived clients. Other donations could include gas cards, Schnuck's gift cards, and unrestricted financial contributions.

For the World Day of Migrants and Refugees, Pope Francis wrote:

“God’s plan is essentially inclusive and gives priority to those living on the existential peripheries. Among them are many migrants and refugees, displaced persons, and victims of trafficking. The Kingdom of God is to be built with them, for without them, it would not be the Kingdom that God wants.”

Faithful Citizenship: Your Vote Matters

With a new voting law in effect, House Bill 1878, the newly formed SFX Advocacy Committee wants to ensure that College Church parishioners and our wider community can access the ballot this November and beyond. Visit sfxstl.org/advocacy or see a Voting Access Ambassador after Masses to learn more.

One of the most harmful aspects of HB1878 is the new requirement to produce a nonexpired photo ID in order to vote, which will greatly impact many Missourians who cannot readily obtain a State ID. These are the people that come to our parish's weekly Outreach Program for help with birth certificates and Missouri State IDs. Leading up to the November election, we will share reflections from volunteers connected to our ID and Birth Certificate Program. Rebecca Cunningham, a current SLU medical student and former program volunteer, shared this:



Over the years as a parishioner at College Church, I have participated in various committees regarding voting rights and, in speaking with Missourians, have been struck by questions and statements such as "Isn't it easy to get an ID? If I can do it, anyone can do it." For many of us in this parish, obtaining a nonexpired photo ID may seem like a minute task. However, multiple barriers exist that make obtaining a photo ID a challenge for many of our community members. While I had heard these challenges enumerated over the years, such as cost or lost documents due to dangerous social situations, I did not fully grasp the frustration of such challenges until I had the opportunity to serve as a volunteer at the SFX Outreach Program in 2020. In the midst of the pandemic, many guests would venture to the College Church ballroom for help obtaining IDs and birth certificates, a program which serves only a small percentage of the population in Missouri. I frequently heard from guests that they needed an ID or birth certificate for work or social services and shared in their frustration when more barriers would appear that would prevent them from quickly obtaining a photo ID. Now,

Missouri House Bill 1878 requires a non-expired photo ID to vote, which will limit the voting eligibility of many Missourians. As Catholics, we are called to care for the vulnerable; therefore, we must be aware and advocate for those who are adversely impacted by this bill, such as those who attend our Outreach program.
